After your child's adenoidectomy...

it's ok to have these:

Snoring or stuffy nose
May last 1-2 weeks

Light blood from nose
May last for 24 hours

Jaw or ear pain

Mild neck stiffness

Low grade fever May last up to 1 wk

Refusing solid food for a few days

Nausea/vomiting

May last 24 hours and have small amounts of blood

Bad breath

May last for several days

Change in voice

May sound hoarse or nasal for several days

Throat pain



Difficulty breathing

Severe ear/throat pain

Not relieved by pain medication

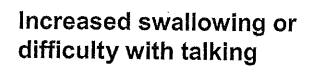
High or persistent fever

Severe, progressive neck pain or stiffness

Drinking too little fluids

Less than 4 cups of fluid per day





Any bleeding

In vomit or from mouth or nose

Go to emergency room if it lasts more
than a few minutes

Bad smell

From throat after 7-10 days

1bout diet & activity:

- No changes in diet are needed because the adenoids are located where the back of the nose joins the throat, where it is protected from food and liquids by the palate.
- You child should get out of bed frequently and return to normal activity as directed by your physician.

Dealing with pain:

- Pain is typically not severe after adenoidectomy. Eating and drinking help reduce pain. Distraction through games, activities, and new toys may also help decrease discomfort.
- Acetaminophen (Tylenol) can be used as often as prescribed, but ibuprofen products (Motrin, Advil) and aspirin should be avoided because they can increase the chance of bleeding.
